

# **Bullying UK**



Bullying¹ happens in every school, but what can you do about it? Bullying UK is a website about bullying. The people at Bullying UK can help you if someone is bullying² you. Someone is bullying you if he or she calls you terrible names, takes your things, steals your money, takes your friends away from you, calls you on the phone but doesn't say anything, sends you bad text messages, or says he or she will hurt you if you don't do something. Maybe they will say awful things about your size, how you look, the colour of your hair, or your family.

Some pupils talk about their experiences on the Bullying UK website.

This is Karen's story: "I was new in my school and I didn't have any friends. There was this group of girls in my class. I thought they were nice. They always met behind some trees in the playground. They wanted to smoke and the teachers couldn't see us there. I didn't smoke and they said terrible things about me. Nothing I did or said was right. Then I had no friends. I was so unhappy and I was afraid to talk to anyone. Then an older girl in the school saw that I was really sad. She talked to me and I told

her about my problem. She said I needed help and that I should talk to a teacher. Later I talked to my favourite teacher. He really listened to me and wanted to help me. I hope that things get better soon because I still do not like school."

But what can you do if a teacher is bullying you? This is Jim's story: "We had this PE teacher. He didn't like you if you weren't good at sport. I've got asthma so I can't run very much. He hated me. He always put me in teams of really good people so they got angry with me. PE lessons were awful. I didn't want to go to school on Tuesdays. After a few weeks it was so bad, I went to my class teacher. He was really nice. He talked to my PE teacher and then it was OK again."

What can we learn from their experiences? If someone is bullying you, *tell someone* – a friend, a teacher or your parents. It won't stop if you don't. If you don't want to talk to your parents, write a note to them. Or write to your grandparents or an aunt or uncle, and ask if they will help you.


