

Mammals: Marsupials in Australia

1. What exactly are marsupials¹?

Marsupials are animals that carry their new-born babies in a pouch². The babies are tiny when they are born. They have no hair so the mother's pouch is the warmest place for them. When they no longer need their mother's milk and can look after themselves, they can leave the pouch.

2. Where do you find marsupials?

They are mostly found in the Americas, Australia, New Guinea and some neighbouring islands. There are about 260 different types of marsupials in the world today.

3. What is their natural habitat³?

They live in forests, plains⁴ and deserts.

4. What are the most common⁵ marsupials in Australia?

Kangaroos, koalas and wombats⁶ are the best known marsupials. There are also wallabies⁷ and possums⁸.

5. What are wallabies?

They are small kangaroos.

6. Why does the Australian coat of arms⁹ have a kangaroo on it?

This animal was chosen as a symbol of Australia because it is a native animal. But the kangaroo is also seen as a symbol of 'moving forward' because it doesn't usually move backwards. The kangaroo on the Australian coat of arms is the Red Kangaroo. This is the biggest marsupial in the world. It can hop at up to 40 miles per hour and can jump up to ten feet high.
