Narrator: Finally, here's our tip for the weekend for those of you staying in the London area.

Ham House near London is much bigger than a normal house. In fact, some people think it's a palace. Many years ago it was the home of rich dukes and duchesses, and kings and queens were often visitors to the house. It was built 400 years ago.



Today the house is owned by a national organization, and it is open to the public. In the summer the house and the gardens are open five days a week, but the house is closed in winter. You can still look round the gardens, though. The house attracts thousands of visitors. A visit costs £8 for adults and £4 for children. It's interesting to see how rich people lived in the past – and it wasn't always fun, believe me!

Ham House has its spooky story, too. People say that the house has been haunted for more than 300 years by the ghost of the beautiful Duchess of Lauderdale and her dog. No other dogs are allowed inside the house! In the school holidays there are special ghost tours for families.

Ham House is on the River Thames about 15 miles west of Central London. Visitors can get there quickly by public transport – by train, or by bus. It is also easy to drive there by car, as the house is quite near to three motorways. There is free parking about 10 minutes' walk away from the house. For people who prefer to walk, there is a nice footpath along the side of the Thames.

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A radio program

Radio presenter: This is Radio Arizona and I'm Chuck Longman with you until five. Today we're looking at Mexican

immigrants and why they want to come to the States. And with us today we have immigration expert,

Todd Every. Hello Todd.

Todd: Hello, Chuck.

Chuck: Todd, the United States has made it more difficult for people to cross our borders since nine eleven.

But you aren't really happy with the changes, are you? Why not?

Todd: Well. The Government hasn't made any changes at our border with Canada so I believe they have done it just to stop illegal immigrants from Mexico.

Chuck: And is that a bad thing?

Todd: Well, illegal immigration is a bad thing, of course. It is not good for anybody. Hundreds of Mexicans die every year while they are trying to cross our border. But now that it is more difficult to cross the Californian border, more people take the risk and go through the mountains in Arizona and that's dangerous. It is also guarded by men with guns. And last year one of the men killed a Mexican while

he was trying to cross the border.

Chuck: But that is terrible. How did that happen?

Todd: It's not clear what happened but that's just one of the many problems we have there.

Chuck: Why do so many Mexicans take the risk and cross into the States every year?

Todd: Because of the poverty in Mexico.

Chuck: But Mexico is not such a poor country, is it?

Todd: No. But there are a few very rich people and many people who are very poor.

Chuck: And what do the illegal immigrants do when they get to the States?

Todd: Well, they can work on farms. Often they pick fruit. A lot of the jobs are just for a season and many of the immigrants leave again when they finish the work. Or that's what happened a few years ago. Now more people stay because it's so difficult to cross the border.

Chuck: And how does that help the immigrant's families?

Todd: They send the money back. Thousands of millions of dollars are sent back to Mexico every year. That's more money than Mexico earns from oil or from tourism.

Chuck: Wow! That's a lot of money. But I still don't really understand. When people live in the States as illegal immigrants, they can't do anything. They can't get somewhere to live. They can't travel easily. What kind of life is that?

Todd: Well, for a lot of them it is freedom. The freedom that money brings. The freedom to eat and to live.

Chuck: Well, Todd. Thanks for that. And that is all we have time for and now over to the news desk.
