Question tags

A question tag is added to the end of a sentence turning it into a question.

In German you use expressions like "..., nicht wahr?" "..., oder?" in a similar way.

- If the statement is positive, the question tag is negative.
- If the statement is negative, the question tag is positive.
- The subject of the verb is the same in the statement and the question tag. Proper names (e.g. Dave) become pronouns (e.g. he).
- If the statement is in the simple present or simple past tense, the question tag uses 'do/don't' or did/didn't'.
- If the statement uses an auxiliary verb (e.g. to be, to have, will, etc.) or a modal (e.g. can, must, etc.) use the modal or auxiliary in the same tense in the tag.

Statement (+)	Tag (-)
Dave knows Paul,	doesn't he?
It rained hard,	didn't it?
Jill will be at the party,	won't she?
Sheila has bought a new car,	hasn't she?
You can speak English,	can't you?

Statement (-)	Tag (+)
You don't know Stephanie,	do you?
Andrew didn't ring,	did he?
The students weren't listening,	were they?
You haven't got a coin,	have you?
We can't stop here,	can we?
