 \hat{a} a) What jobs do you have to do at home? Write a list and compare it with a partner's list.

b) Read the text. Make a note of all the things that Tamara has to do.

My name's Tamara. I'm fifteen. I live in Birmingham with my mum and dad, my sister Daisy and my brother Mason. Mason's five and Daisy's nine. Daisy is disabled and I help my mum to care for her.

My dad's a long-distance lorry driver, so he's often away for a week or more.

Something went wrong when Daisy was born. Her brain was damaged, so she will never really grow up. The problem is that her body will grow, but her brain will stay at about 3 years old. Also, she can't see very well. I go to the local comprehensive school, Mason goes to the local primary school and Daisy goes to a special school. Mum works at a bank. That means that in the mornings we have to get to four different places. It's very hard on Mum, so I try to help as much as I can. I give Daisy



a shower and dress her while my mum gets breakfast and makes our packed lunches. Then Mum takes Mason to school and I wait with Daisy for the special bus that picks her up on school days. Then I go to school. After school I cook the tea while Mum does things for Daisy, then after tea I put Daisy to bed and start on my homework.

Most people at school don't know about Daisy, and if I meet my friends after school, I go to their houses. One friend came home with me once, but she said that she was upset by Daisy. She has never come again. There is one friend who comes to the park with us sometimes. She's OK with Daisy, and that's great.

It's a bit difficult at weekends, and we don't often go out together as a family. People don't understand a nine-year-old who acts as if she was three. I often look after Daisy so that my mum can go shopping, and if I go shopping, I go with my friends, because Mum has to stay home with Daisy.

Once a month Tamara goes to a meeting of a 'Young Carers' group. "It's really important to me," she says. They can play sports and games and chat. "It's great," Tamara says," because they're all like me. I don't have to explain about Daisy. They know what it's like."

Some of the young carers who go to the group are looking after a parent. Tom is 12. His mum is in a wheelchair. "She can only use one hand," he says, "so I do the cooking." Things used to be very difficult, but now life is easier because his mum has a special car. "Now we can go to the supermarket and do the shopping together!" Tom says.

Tamara and Tom are both looking forward to a special holiday. They're going to the Young Carers' Festival for a weekend. "It'll be great," Tom thinks. "You can do things like rock climbing and abseiling."

"And they'll have a disco, too!" Tamara adds.

c) Share: Do you think the Young Carers' group is the solution to Tamara and Tom's problems? What else could help them? Make some suggestions and discuss them in your group, then report to the class.

(Think about young people you know, who help to care for a brother or sister, or a parent or grandparent. Do you think it's right for young people to do this? Do they have too many duties and not enough rights? What do can be done to help them?)
