■ Gabriella, 17 Being a girl means that you have to work harder for everything. Girls are often seen as vulnerable and less able than boys, so you have to prove yourself. I find it unfair that I have to stay inside at night while boys are allowed to go out. I feel like I have to prove that I'm strong enough to be able to go out and look after myself. I think people often think of women who want to do well at work in a bad light but that is unfair because all they're trying to do is succeed in what still seems like a man's world. I feel like there's quite a bit of pressure on me to be able to balance still being seen as a "girl" but also being strong without acting masculine.
