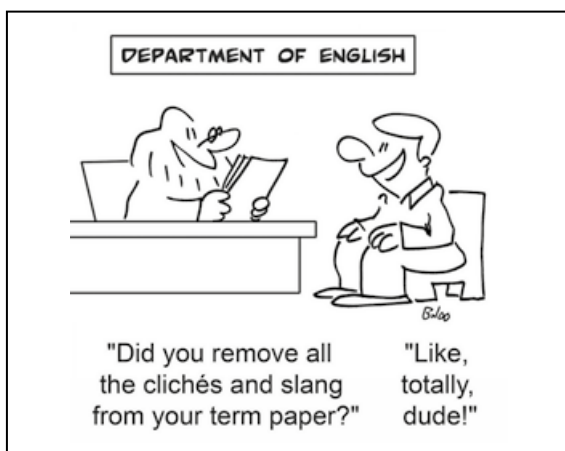




## What you say and how you say it

### What can you say?

Choose an appropriate reaction to each situation.

**Across cultures**
